

Welcome to Comics and Medicine: The Sequential Art of Illness!

This second conference on comics and medicine follows the inaugural one held at University College London one year ago. Brian Fies said in an interview for the website Comics Worth Reading, "I left (the London conference) feeling that I'd been part of the start of something that could grow into a very interesting and important piece of both comics and medicine."

With such a great beginning in 2010, we wanted the 2011 conference to maintain much of what worked so well last year: the high level of discussion, the zesty impact of mixing disciplines (cartoonists, scholars, health care workers, patients, clients, and therapists), the intense focus on what reading and making comics could offer to medicine, and of course, the chance to get together in a great city.

This year, we are thrilled to have another group of dynamite keynote speakers-- Paul Gravett (back again, we're happy to say), Phoebe Gloeckner, David Small, and Scott McCloud. Their perspectives on comics and medicine stretch from comics history to comics as craft and art, to comics as an illuminating medium and set of texts and practices.

In addition, we have made even more time this year for presentation and conversation: nearly two full days of workshops and panels on comics as art, teaching with comics, practicing medicine with comics, comics and illness, and comics scholarship. We are also pleased to present an exhibit of art featuring many of the graphic texts we will be discussing.

And in addition to offering CME credits for the first time this year, we also offer opportunities to learn from the cartoonists themselves. Neil Phillips, Brian Fies, and Sarah Leavitt are offering workshops providing hands-on experience.

Finally, in addition to many opportunities for book sales throughout the conference, we will conclude with a closing reception and book signing on Saturday (6:30-9:00pm) at Chicago's own QUIMBY'S Books, so make sure to get a spot on the shuttle bus leaving from 375 E. Chicago Avenue at 6:10 pm on Saturday.

All of the organizers will be available during the conference to answer any questions you may have. Take a look at our pictures so you can recognize us, and please feel free to share feedback and ideas you may have about the conference. We hope you have as much fun at the conference as we had organizing it!






